FAB FOOD FOR CHRISTMAS

SHORTBREAD

125g plain flour

100g rice flour

100g almond meal

Pinch of salt

225g butter (best used when soft)

100g caster sugar and extra for dredging.

Grease and base line a 30cm (12in) round/square baking tin Sift flours and salt add meal. Rub in the butter. Add sugar and knead lightly to mix Roll out mixture to fit tin and press evenly into tin. Bake at 170°-180° C (325°-350° F) for 1 to 1¼ hours, until coloured. Dredge with sugar. Cut into portions while still warm and leave to cool in tin on a wire rack Trish and Alan Berry



A QUIZZING QUESTION

At the November Food Group gathering Julia emceed a quiz to test members' gardening knowledge. One of the questions was what is a hesperidium? The answer was a type of berry



that has a leathery outer skin such as citrus. Hesperidin is a flavanone glycoside found in citrus fruits. Its aglycone form is called hesperetin. Its name is derived from the word "hesperidium", for fruit produced by citrus trees. Hesperidin was first isolated in 1828 by French chemist M. Lebreton from the white inner layer of citrus peels. Hesperidin, alone or in combination with other citrus bioflavonoids (such as diosmin), is most commonly used for blood vessel conditions such as

hemorrhoids, varicose veins, and poor circulation (venous stasis).

MARVELLOUS MAROOCHY

While on a recent visit to the Sunshine Coast I was lucky enough to visit the Maroochy Regional Bushland Botanic Garden. Not only is it a stunning 82 hectare showcase for



eucalypt and riparian forest but it is also the home of 13 magnificent sculptures created during the Stone International Symposium hosted by the Sunshine Coast Council in 2005. This botanic garden is one of the inspirations for the Tweed Regional Botanic Garden at Eviron and is a good example of what can be achieved by volunteers.



A BONANZA FOR BIRDS

In the same region the Queensland Government in association with Noosa Council and Noosa

Parks Association Bird Observers Group have created the Noosa Bird Trail, an impressive network of forests, national parks and public open spaces where a rich diversity of birdlife can be observed in their natural habitat.
